A small school situated on the road to the Pahiatua Track if you turn off State Highway 2 at the Mangamaire turnoff going north. Then cross the single lane bridge over the Mangahao River and wind up the right hand hill to the flat lands 17 Kilometres from Pahiatua via Mangamaire

- $31^{\rm st}$  May 1894 A request was received from a number of settlers at Nikau, asking for a grant of £10 in aid of a school
- 31<sup>st</sup> August 1894 Mr T. R. Fleming, B.A., one of the Education Board inspectors, has returned from a three weeks' visit to schools in the Forty Mile Bush. During his absence he paid surprise visits to 16 schools between Masterton and Mangatainoka, all of which were fairly satisfactory, with the exception of two or three, in which changes have already been decided upon by the Education Board. He also made enquiries as to the requirements of Scarborough and Nikau in regard to school accommodation.
- 26<sup>th</sup> April 1895 Mr T R Fleming Inspector to visit Nikau School on the 9<sup>th</sup> March
- 31<sup>st</sup> July 1895 Wellington Education Board Mr. McCardle promised to report regarding the question of erecting a residence at Nikau.
- Mr. Flood [Sic Floyd] was appointed sole teacher of the Nikau School
- 28<sup>th</sup> August 1895 Wellington Education Board On the motion of Mr. McCardle, the Chairman was instructed to apply to the School Commissioners for five acres of the Nikau education reserve as a school site.

Edward Floyd only taught for the Wellington Education Board at Nikau. An Edward Floyd was often in Court for Drunkenness but not in 1895 when a Edward Floyd was teaching at Nikau.

Kate Hardwick started teaching in 1892 at Mt Cook Infants and finished in the next three years as a pupil teacher at Kaitara school before moving to Nikau for one year and then going to Nireaha for 1897

T R Bowden only taught for the Wellington Education Board at Nikau School In 1894 T R Bowden was teacher at Mangaweka. In 1900 he was teacher at Te Awaite the whaling station in Queen Charlotte Sound then he went to Cullensville for the Marlborough Education Board He then went to Fairhall school just out of Blenheim

- 12<sup>th</sup> November 1902 Miss Wilson, now on the staff of the Nikau School, has been definitely appointed to the Ngaturi School.
- 14<sup>th</sup> November 1902 Miss Jane Davies appointed sole teacher
- 18<sup>th</sup> November 1902 Miss Davies, the popular lady teacher of Clareville, is to be transferred to Nikau, where she will have solo charge. This lady will be greatly missed, being a decided favourite with all she came in contact with, and more especially the children under her charge.
- 18<sup>th</sup> November 1903 The Taueru School Committee has accepted Miss E. C. Wilson as we teacher for its school. Miss Wilson's successor at the Nikau School will be Miss Davies, [Miss Wilson this Miss Wilson was Elizabeth C Wilson.
- 26<sup>th</sup> June 1903 Wellington Education Board here was a long list of requisitions for repairs, fencing and other small works, but as none of them seemed to be important or urgent, it was decided to allow them all to stand over. They included the following:—and Nikau, £-1;

24<sup>th</sup> March 1904 Wellington Education Board Permission was given Mrs. Baker Gubb, Nikau, to build a teacher's residence in the school ground.

12<sup>th</sup> July 1904 St. Patrick's Church, Masterton, this morning, a marriage of more than usual interest was solemnised, when Mr Bernard J. Dolan, junior partner of the firm of Messrs Bunny and Dolan, solicitors, of Masterton, was married to Miss Gertrude Rosa Baker-Gabb, third daughter of Mr Charles Baker-Gabb, of Nikau, Pahiatua. The ceremony, which was performed by the Very Rev. Dean McKenna, was witnessed by several friends and well-wishers of the happy couple.[Charles Baker Gubb lived in the Pahiatua electorate and later went to the Hawkes Bay

Mary Baker Gabb didn't marry in New Zealand. In 1913 The Tainui had an collision in Fog on its way to England and one of the passengers was an M Baker Gabb which would tie in with the above table on dates. There is one reference in a newspaper to her being at Taranaki Girls College as Miss Montgomery. Mary Baker Gabb was on the electoral roll in the Taranaki in 1896

Interesting story

13<sup>th</sup> December 1904 C H W Lock was headmaster of Aramaho School Wanganui and he didn't resign until December 1909. His wife Matilda was teaching for the Wellington Education Board during this period. By 1914 Mrs Lock was living in Wellington

2<sup>nd</sup> October 1931 FORMER PALAIERSTON NORTH SCHOOLMASTER. For many years a prominent figure in the teaching profession, Mr C. H. W. Lock, St. Heliers, Auckland, was 90 years of age yesterday. Soldier and scholar, He played a worthy part in the life of the colony during the difficult days of the Maori wars, and now, still the possessor of a robust constitution, lie devotes his leisure to reading and the joys of a well-stocked garden. Born at Notting Hill, London, on October 1, 1841, Mr Lock received his education at Rugby, and on leaving the famous school obtained a commission in the Army, serving as a sub lieutenant in the 43rd Infantry. He sailed for New Zealand in the ship King of Italy, arriving at Auckland in 1865. As soon as lie landed he joined the Armed Constabulary and was on military duty at Opotiki when the Poverty Bay Massacre occurred, and Rev. Mr Volkner was murdered by the Maoris. He served three years in the constabulary at Gisborne, and on obtaining his discharge entered upon his life work as a school teacher in 1875.

Mr Lock has been headmaster of schools at Lower Rangitikei. Bulls and Palmerston North. At Palmerston North he was the fourth headmaster of the original Central School which stood on the site now occupied by the Princess Hotel. He was assistant master at the Wanganui Boys' High School, first assistant at the Newtown School, Wellington, and in 1883 was appointed headmaster of Aramaho School, Wanganui, a position he hold for a number of years. He retired in 1906 [Sic], and after spending many years in Wellington, he took up his residence in Auckland nine years ago.

Mrs Lock is 74 years of age and there are nine children, one of whom is Mr H. W. Lock, who is a teacher at Colyton.

James J Trainer taught in 1908 at Levin DHS [Listed as John J] then 1909 and 1910 at Nikau Then until 1915 was at Shannon School in the Horowhenua. In 1916 he came to Masterton to teach at the DHS before joining the armed forces in 1917 as a Lieutenant

13<sup>th</sup> May 1908 Wellington Education Board Mrs M Lock appointed

28<sup>th</sup> May 1908 Mrs M. Baker-Gabb, B.A., mistress of the Nikau School for four years past, who has been promoted to the position of secondary assistant at the Pahiatua District High School, was entertained in the schoolroom at Nikau, subsequent to the annual prize-giving ceremony, on Friday evening last, The past and present pupils presented her with a case of silver-backed hair-brushes, and the residents with a copper kettle, with stand and spirit lamp. A musical and elocutionary programme by scholars and others was followed by a dance.

1<sup>st</sup> August 1908 Wellington Education Board Nikau: That for the convenience of the teacher the residence on the site be allowed to remain, subject to one month's notice that it be removed.

As the railway time-table is unsuitable, no pupils use the train. Nine travel by cycle or on horseback and three board in Pahiatua.

4<sup>th</sup> May 1918 Corporal Godfrey D. [David] White has died of wounds. Deceased was brought up at Carterton and Napier and resided at Pahiatua for sometime. The late soldier was thrice wounded. His sister is Miss White, teacher at. the Nikau school. [Miss M J White teacher was his sole relative in New Zealand] Their parents lived in England.

Miss M J White taught at Kaitawa until January 1919 and then disappeared from Wellington Education Board lists [I wonder if she went back to England]
