Parkvale: 1879-1976 4 Kilometres from Carterton on Carters Line North East of Carterton

1878

18th November Meeting called by Wellington Education Board to elect a School Committee

20th December An offer of an acre of land by Mr Carter was accepted by Board

1879

April 1879 Tender of J A Petherick for the erection of a school was accepted

28th May Schoolhouse tender to Mr W B Allen for £215

23rd December The school to be an aided school until the working average reached 25

1880

26th January. First school Roll 25. Children being taught in the school residence

Mr Brittain appointed first teacher

School Committee elected Mr L Nix (Chairman) S Oates, Roy, Dalgety, Miller, Stoodley and Fairbrother.

1882

25th January The resignation of Mrs. Powley, of Parkvale, was accepted 25

2nd February Mr Brown Assistant teacher appointed

29th March Mrs Powley left

There are at present at the Parkvale School on the Taratahi 35 children, and Mrs Powley, who has for some time past had charge of the school but who leaves for England in a few days, at the recent examination hold on the 16th inst. concluded her services at the school by presenting 22 children and passing all creditably without a single failure, while the roll-book shows the utmost regularity in the attendance of the children, and we trust to see Mrs Hanson as successful in the conduct of the school as her predecessor has been. On Friday a treat was given to the children by the committee and some of their friends in Mr R, Fairbrother's paddock, and all seemed

to thoroughly enjoy themselves, Racing, jumping, and other sports took place for prizes, while the usual round of games at such meetings were indulged in, At 4.30 the children were marched up to the schoolhouse where a substantial tea had been provided which was done full justice to by the youngsters. Prizes were then distributed to the successful scholars to the value of £12, and also the following three extra One by Mr L. Nix for the best attendance; one by Mr Miller for the greatest number of marks at the examination, Jane Eaton; and one by Mrs Powley, a doll most tastefully arrayed to the little girl who obtained the greatest number of marks during the year, Ada Osborn. The committee have also presented Mrs Powley with an address and a handsome volume as a mark of their regard for the good service she has done in the district. 31st January Parkvale school and alterations 150 pound

1884

School Committee First meeting in new school

27th June The Chairman was instructed to obtain a solicitor's opinion as to the legality of the election to the Parkvale Committee of a certain parent who, it was alleged, was not a householder, as he is living in lodgings PP

24th September The resignation of five of the Parkvale Committee was received. It was decided to point out to the writers that the resignation must be tendered to the remaining members of the Committee, and not to the Board of Education PP

1886

Mr Richards took charge

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Meeting of Mr. Richards' Creditors.

A meeting of the creditors of Charles Alfred Richards, late headmaster of the Lower Hutt School, was held at 11 o'clock this morning, and was attended by five persons. The Official Assignee was in the chair. Mr. Skerrett appeared for the debtor. The Official Assignee read the list of assets and liabilities, showing the latter to amount to £242 2s sd, the principal creditors being Mr. Peter Speedy (£64), Bell, Gully and Iazard (£80), and Mr. R. Cleland (£54). The assets were furniture, horse, and trap, valued by the debtor at £200. The following statement by the debtor was read by the Official Assignee: — "For the past six years I have been head master of the Hutt State School, and previously I have had similar positions for

many years. I have hitherto lived so as to keep my expenditure within my income, and my present difficulties are entirely due to heavy expenses incurred in a law suit. I am now out of employment, owing to the said law suit resulting in my resignation, and, with the pressing claim for immediate payment of Mr. Peter Speedy's claim, I have no alternative but to give up my small estate for the joint benefit of my creditors, and place myself at their discretion." Replying to a question, Mr. R. Cleland said that his claim was for groceries supplied. The Official Assignee stated that a bailiff he had sent out to the Hutt had estimated the assets would realise £102. Mr. Skerrett said that his client was practically penniless, and was not in a position to make any proposals. On the motion of Mr. C. H. Izard, seconded by Mr. Brandon, it was decided to hand back the debtor's furniture. Mr. Cleland moved that the meeting recommend the debtor's discharge. Mr. Izard, in seconding the proposal, said that it was no use trying to make the debtor pay when he was not in a position to do so. The Official Assignee observed that the bankruptcy was not one in which there had been any recklessness. The resolution was carried unanimously, and the meeting terminated.

1887

24th February There were severe bush fires in the district the smoke being almost unbearable

4th March Owing to bushfires destroying fences many children had to stay at home to mind cattle

30th November Mrs Richards sewing mistress

1888

16th March A terrible storm caused anxiety for the school property. The teacher spoke to the chairman about topping the blue gum trees and sweeping the chimney. The chairman considered the trees all right and advised the teacher to select a wet day and set the chimney on fire.

20th September. Mr Deller. chairman waited on Mr Carter to see if school grounds could be enlarged, Mr Carter kindly gave another piece of ground the same size as the first and adjoining it at the rear.

22nd February Mr Burrows of Gladstone gave a picnic to the school children on his property, providing two large brakes and horses and all entertainments for all girls and boys The party left at 9.30 am and

after having dinner and tea and the run of the orchard in between times, returned home at dusk

6th August Mr Clifton a School Committee member was buried.

12th August Mr Trotman started additions to the school

13th August A search party of about 100 was out on the hills looking for a lad named Thompson who was later found dead

28th August Additional grants for building of shelter sheds for schools at Pahautanui, Parkvale

1890

26th March. The school was closed on account of a wedding solemnised in the school room

5th July Additions to Parkvale School H Trotman 165 pounds 10 shillings

Edith Richards first year pupil teacher 15th Feb 1890. 2nd year 11th Feb 1892. 3rd Year 1895

1891

27th May Tenders for altering the teacher's residence at Mangaone and repairing the Parkvale schoolhouse were opened. As the amounts were above the estimates it was resolved to invite fresh tenders.

1893

13th February Heavy bush fires and many homes in danger.

30th August Edith Oliver aged 15 who had passed all exams and three drawing certificates died of Diphtheria

4th September School closed on account of Diphtheria Edwin and Clara Oliver succumbed to the same fate as their sister. Three children buried in four days

1895

28th January Severe bush fires all around the district.

2nd March Mr Cothching demonstrated a gramophone. Two people had their voices recorded

15th March Bush fires still very unpleasant.

27th March It was resolved that the carpenter should put up some fencing at the Parkvale School to prevent the horses of pupils wandering on the grounds

29th March Mr Richards left on a health trip. Mrs Richards and Miss May Richards left in charge.

21st May The Education Board at its next meeting will appoint head teachers for the Parkvale and Mangamahoe schools. Twenty-four applications have been received for the former, and 22 for the latter position

25th May The schoolmaster's residence at Parkvale was destroyed by fire last night. The school was scorched only. An inquest will be held. Mr. G. A. Richards, the schoolmaster, had his furniture insured for £180 in the Liverpool, London and Globe office. PP

26th May. School residence burned. School closed down.

28th June. Mr Drummond appointed head teacher.

31st July Architect was directed to prepare plans of a teacher's residence at Parkvale

8th August CRIMINAL SESSIONS. (Before His Honour the Chief Justice.) Yesterday. Arson. At the trial of Martha Richards, charged with having set fire to the residence connected with the Parkvale School on the 24th May last, the following evidence was taken yesterday afternoon : —

John Standen stated that on arriving at the fire he entered the house, and on going into the bedroom he found the mattress smouldering. He stamped out the fire. The building was alight at the back, and as far as he knew the fire had not broken through the partition into the bedroom.

Alice Ackerman and William Corlett said they saw a number of articles, of bedding etc. in one of the school shelter-sheds, and did not know how they came to be there.

Constable Darby, stationed at Carterton. said he visited the scene of the fire early the following morning. Mrs. Richards told him she could not account for the kerosene being on the mattress and ticking, as there was no lamp in the bedroom, and they rarely need lamps. He found a tin which contained about a quart of kerosene behind a hedge at the back of where the house had stood. Mrs. Richards said the fire occurred through a faulty chimney. After her arrest she protested her innocence, and said they had lost .£500 by the fire.

G. W. Dellar, Cornelius Croft, and John Ackerman also gave evidence for the prosecution.

Mr. Skerrett, addressing the jury for the defence, submitted that the evidence had failed to show motive, or, in fact, anything against the accused inconsistent with innocence The kerosene found on the mattress and ticking was not proved to have been there before they were removed from the house, and it was more than probable it was spilled on them afterwards, as lamps were among the articles removed. The articles seen in the shelter-shed were probably put

there by someone assisting in recovering things from the fire ; there was no evidence to the contrary. The jury, after a short retirement, acquitted the accused

28th August Tenders were ordered to be invited for the erection of a teachers residence at Parkvale PP

25th September A special allowance of £10 was made to Miss Richards, Parkvale for extra services

Parkvale

Parkvale Public School, which is situated about three miles from Carterton, was opened in 1880 with twenty-five children. The numbers in 1896 were sixty-three, the headmaster being assisted by a pupil-teacher. The building, which contains two rooms, is situated on a site of about two acres in extent in one of the highest parts of the district, from which a capital view is obtainable.

Mr. Robert Crawford Drummond, the Headmaster of the Parkvale Public School, was born in Wellington in 1869, and was educated at the Wellington College. Entering on his educational career, Mr. Drummond was engaged as a teacher at the Mount Cook Boys'

School for eight years, and was in charge of Te Horo School for two years, receiving his present appointment in 1895.

The children, who were in charge of the head-teachers— Mr. R. Stout (Dalefield), Mr. H. Nightingale (Belvedere), and Mr. J. Davidson (Parkvale.)— enjoyed the excursion highly. Lunch was served in the train, and special cars were waiting at the Lambton Station to convey the party to Newtown Park. After a pleasant ramble about the Zoo, the youngsters repaired 'to "the Newtown Museum, and spent the rest of the day till 6 p.m. in strolling about the city and waterfront 25th

1918

Huge bushfires a long way off darkened the sky so that it was impossible to carry on the school work and the children were sent home.

1919

22 November An impressive ceremony took place at the Parkvale School on Thursday, when a roll of honour presented by Mr. L. Nix was unveiled in the presence of school pupils and a large number of settlers, their wives, and representative citizens. Appropriate addresses were delivered by Messrs. A. W. Hogg, J. T. M: Hornsby, Sir Walter Buchanan, and Mr. Howard Booth (Mayor of Carterton)

1923

13th September Football grounds The best part is the Carter's Land on the part of Carter's Estate leased by the Wellington Education Board Western End

This land had been used by the teacher, presumably for grazing stock

1st October The plan does not show the horse paddock which is nearly two acres and below the school site. This land was used as a horse paddock before the land was acquired by the Board

24th March Letter from Public Trustee saying they can't find any paperwork saying the land belongs to the Wellington Education Board

28th March Wellington Education Board suddenly finds it owns 8 acres of land next to school C R Carter estate

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14th October Letter from F S Combs to Wellington Education Board re Complaint

- a) Bryant Booth was 14 in Form 2, He was tall but not robust
- b) Mr. Bassett reported that his 2 boys were bullied by some boys and Brian Booth on the way home
- c) I warned all the boys that they were under the authority of the head master until they got home
- d) Peter Stalker on his last day of school was bullied, his shirt was torn, Pencils taken from his bag and a small sum of money taken, (Money for sweeping out the school)
- e) Two weeks later I had reason to punish Booth for littering the playground with Orange peel; which he knew it was contrary to instructions
- f) He was punished for not sweeping
- g) Under the previous teacher the Booths removed their children and sent them to a private school in Masterton
- h) Etc.

October 15th letter from School Committee and above remark from teacher sent to board as it was outside School Committee jurisdiction

Sweeping duties are allocated to pupils from Standard 3 to Form 2. Bryant Booth was obliged to sweep for one week

Mr. Booth visited me on Saturday accompanied by his son. He would not listen to an explanation and did not ask for one

He was abusive in front of his son

28th September Letter from H B Booth Middle Run. I am very annoyed because my son asked another boy to sweep the school for him. Because of the Teacher's attitude we are taking our son away from Parkvale School

I also ask you as chairman (Letter to Mr. Brassell) if you could collect Bryant's books as he accused me of trespassing when I called on Saturday morning to collect Bryant's books

- d) This incident created tension in social life of the district which can only be described as electric
- e) Reversal of policy on calf clubs after School Committee and Home and School thought they had reached an agreement
- f) Two families have already withdrawn from the school
