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13<sup>th</sup> February 1893 Mr Seddon has expressed the opinion that Scarborough is the more suitable place for the main Pahiatua railway station than Mangatainoko.

10<sup>th</sup> May 1893 An attempt is being made to establish a school at Scarborough.

2<sup>nd</sup> June 1893 Wellington Education Board. At the meeting of the Wellington Education Board on Wednesday, a petition was received from Scarborough for the establishment of a school in that district and referred to the inspectors to report upon. The petition was signed by thirteen residents, having thirty-five children of school age.

13<sup>th</sup> October 1893 Pahiatua School Committee he Board asi.et for a recommendation upon a petition for an aided school at Scarborough and it was resolved to report favorably on the petition.

25<sup>th</sup> October 1893 Wellington Education Board It was agreed to temporarily open an aided school at Scarborough.

27<sup>th</sup> October 1893 Wellington Education Board A requisition was received from Scarborough for an aided school. Mr McArdle stated, that in time of flood children would not be able to get to the school; and on his proposal the request was referred to the committee.

29<sup>th</sup> November 1893 It was decided to invite applications for a teacher for the .Scarborough School near Pahiatua, and forward them to the committee

18<sup>th</sup> January 1894 Teachers are also required for Aided schools as under— Scarborough. Particulars on application to James Miller Milton, Pahiatua. [An aided school is where the Education Board paid the local committee a sum based on the average roll and the local committee provided a classroom and a teacher approved by the Wellington Education Board]

26<sup>th</sup> February 1894 Miss Laura Hall has been selected by the local committee as mistress of the new school to be opened at Scarborough

7<sup>th</sup> March 1894 [NB Woodville School was in the Hawkes Bay Education Board Area]

A special meeting of the Woodville School Committee was held on Monday night to receive the resignation of Miss Laura Hall, who has been appointed to Scarborough School. The members of Committee present were: Messrs Sowry, Hall, Bliss, Cross, and Horne. Miss Hall asked to be released as soon as possible and the Committee decided to ask the Board to agree to her request. The Committee resolved to ask the Board to send an assistant mistress

19<sup>th</sup> March 1894 Mr Lee Wellington Education Board School Inspector to insect Scarborough 17<sup>th</sup> of next month

4<sup>th</sup> June 1894 A large store is to be opened at Scarborough.

3<sup>rd</sup> August 1894 Owing to the illness of Miss Hall from influenza, the Scarborough School has had to be closed.

25<sup>th</sup> August 1894 Mr T. R. Fleming, B.A., one of the Education Board inspectors, has returned from a three weeks' visit to schools in the Forty Mile Bush. During his absence he

paid surprise visits to 16 schools between Masterton and Mangatainoka, all of which were fairly satisfactory, with the exception of two or three, in which changes have already been decided upon by the Education Board. He also made enquiries as to the requirements of Scarborough and Nikau in regard to school accommodation.

31<sup>st</sup> August 1894 The N.Z. Farmers' Union have under consideration the establishment in the near future of a large central dairy factory at Scarborough, with creameries in several parts of the Mangahao Block.

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27<sup>th</sup> March 1895 Wellington Education Board The Chairman moved that the salaries of the teachers at Scarborough, Waingawa, Tauherenikau, and Whiteman's Valley schools be fixed at £100 per annum, thus raising them from the status of aided schools to State schools and that the salaries attached to the Whakataki, Te Whiti, Stokes' Valley, and Kaitoke Schools be reduced, after due notice, to £80 per annum,' they having fallen below the status of Bond schools the motion was carried

19<sup>th</sup> April 1895 Inspector T R Fleming to visit Scarborough on the 6<sup>th</sup> May

3<sup>rd</sup> May 1895 Woodville Examiner [Farewell from Woodville of Teacher Laura Hall's Mother to Scarborough] TO MRS E. HALL. At the Bank yesterday, the members of the Woodville Ladies' Benevolent Society met to acknowledge in a practical way the valuable work done for the Society by Mrs Edwin Hall on the occasion of her leaving Woodville for her new home at Scarborough. The acknowledgement took the form of a handsome parlor clock, purchased from Mr Mortensen. As showing the desire of the Society to show the high esteem in which Mrs Hall has been held by the members, all were present with the exception of two. Mrs Burnett, the President, made the presentation, and in doing so referred in terms of high appreciation to the good work Mrs Hall had done for the Society, since its commencement, in the respective offices of President and Secretary. They had had many pleasant gatherings together, and Mrs Hall had ever been ready to do her utmost to further the interests of the Society, and to supply the needs of those whose requirements had called the Society into existence. Each strike of the clock would serve to remind Mrs Hall of her connection with the Society, and the work they had joined in together. Mrs Hall, who was much affected by the kindness shown her, and the occasion of parting from those who had so long worked with her, briefly expressed her appreciation of their gift, and wished the Society success. She would always be glad to hear of its work and of its welfare. A warm farewell to Mrs Hall, with the best wishes of those present, concluded (he ceremony. TO MISS HALL. As soon as it became known that Miss Hall was severing her connection with Holy Trinity Church, in the choir of which Church Miss Hall has been leading soprano for the past six years, her friends determined to show their appreciation of her services by presenting her with some token of their goodwill towards her. This took the form of a handsome gold bangle set with a diamond surrounded by amethysts, and on which were engraved Miss Hall's initials and the year. The presentation took place after choir practice last night. In the absence of Mr Grant, choirmaster, Mr Burnett made the presentation, and, in a happy speech, testified to Miss Hall's valuable services in the musical portion of the church service, and hoped the small token of their regard for her would always remind her

of the many friends and well-wishers she had in Woodville. Mr Nicholls returned thanks for Miss Hall.

8<sup>th</sup> May 1895 Mr and Mrs Edwin Hall leave Woodville on Friday for their new home at Scarborough. During their residence of about nine years in Woodville, Mr and Mrs Hall and their daughters have rendered many a good service to the town and district, and wherever their help was needed it has always been accorded with a hearty goodwill. We wish them a long and happy life in their new home.

13<sup>th</sup> September 1895 The Pahiatua Burns Club has had the enterprise to institute an annual competition in the recitation of selections from the works of the poet by children attending the schools of the district. The first contest was held last Wednesday in the large new' hall at Pahiatua, when 11 competitors, ranging from 10 to 14 years of age, presented themselves. The judges were Messrs R. C. Bruce (ex-M.H.R.), D. Macpherson (Dunedin), A. S. Paterson (Wellington) and G. Swan (Napier). In making their award these gentlemen regretted that there was not a prize for all, so intelligently was the recitation given by each one.....the second, Burns' works in two large volumes, to Grace George, of Hawera [Hamua] School, and the third, one volume, to Kate Turner, of Scarborough School.

30<sup>th</sup> March 1896 The Scarborough School Concert

. The concert, social and dance entertainment given by the Scarborough School committee for their piano fund on Friday evening in the Olympic Theatre, Pahiatua, was a pronounced success, and the acceptable items of the Woodville amateurs helped materially towards it. The result must be\* gratifying to all concerned. Refreshments were served in abundance, and in this respect to ladies of Pahiatua helped their Scarborough friends in a most generous manner. The many who assisted did so out of compliment to the popular mistress of the school, Miss Laura Hall, and to her must be given credit for the success of the concert. The concert was opened by an enjoyable instrumental trio by Mrs Grant (piano), Mr Grunt (violin) and Mr G. T. Hall (flute.) Mr Turnbull sang " McGregor's Gathering," and Miss DeCastro who has a decidedly nice voice, '• The Love Tide." Mr Gould's song was encored, as was also the Misses Hall's duet, ;| I know a bank." " Davy Jones," by Mr Gram, was a pleasurable item and received an encore Mr Osborne was recalled for " Mrs 'Enry' Awkins," responding with ""The Man who Broke the Bank at Monte Carlo." The Highland dancing of Master Smith to the bagpipe accompaniment of his father was exceedingly clever and much enjoyed. The " Marehe Hongroise" played by Miss Carnell opened the second part of the programme. Mr Lucas sang very well, and The act by the Hall family was one of the best items on the programme Miss Wood's song was encored, and she responded with a quaint and cleverly rendered little song, the gem of the evening- Mr Downard gave '• The Arab's Farewell to His Steed," and a duet followed by Miss L. Hall and Mr Gould. Mr Grant sang " The Quaker," and Mr Usborne concluded the programme with " Wot Cher," having to respond. The dance afterwards was very

well attended, many ladies staying to look on. Mr Shaw provided the music. The Committee expect to clear 19 by the entertainment.

10<sup>th</sup> April 1896 Inspector Lee to be at Scarborough on 27<sup>th</sup> April

29<sup>th</sup> April 1896 The Woodville line is expected to be completed by October, as far as Pahiatua. The station at Scarborough is to be known as "Pahiatua station."

27<sup>th</sup> May 1896 Wellington Education Board The erection of a school at Scarborough was deferred until funds are available

24<sup>th</sup> June 1896 Wellington Education Board Miss Olive Dorset, pupil teacher at Scarborough

26<sup>th</sup> April 1896 Wellington Education Board The Chairman said there was a laxity of attendance at three country schools, particularly at Scarborough, where the attendance had fallen from 34 to 27

30<sup>th</sup> September 1896 The Board decided that it could not appoint a truant officer at Scarborough, but agreed to erect another room as soon as the grant was made

25<sup>th</sup> November 1896 Wellington Education Board Requests for a school at Brownstown [Hukanui], for gates to the Scarborough school site, and for fencing the Taratahi West grounds, were left in the hands of the Chairman.

9<sup>th</sup> December 1890 Pahiatua County council Correspondence from F. Hill, asking to have bridge erected on road leading to new school ground at Scarborough

4<sup>th</sup> February 1897 Wellington Education Board The following tenders, in addition to those already published, were accepted :-Kaipororo School, A. Dunstall, .£113 13 s ; Scarborough School, Godfrey and Son, .£198;

16<sup>th</sup> February 1897 Inspector Lee to visit on the 15<sup>th</sup> March

23<sup>rd</sup> February 1897 Olive Dorset passed her second year Pupil Teacher examinations

24<sup>th</sup> February 1897 Wellington Education Board The alteration of the site for the Scarborough School was deferred until the feeling of the Scarborough Committee has been ascertained in the matter.

15<sup>th</sup> March 1897 The first passenger train left Scarborough on Saturday, This waft the school excursion train to Wellington, but it will be a month before the lino is opened for regular traffic.

30<sup>th</sup> March 1897 School District Wellington Education Board SCARBOROUGH. On the west by the Mangahao School District, on the north by the Mangatainoka School District, on the east by the Mangatainoka River, on the south by Section 18, Block XL, and Section 13, Block X., Mangahao, and the Mangahao River

1<sup>st</sup> April 1897 Wellington Education Board The arrangements of the Board with reference to an exchange of a school reserve at Scarborough were agreed to.

4<sup>th</sup> May 1897 A very large number of people availed themselves of the opportunity given for being present at the formal opening of the Eketahuna to Pahiatua railway extension. When the train reached Pahiatua there were upwards of 500 people on it. These, together with a large crowd awaiting ' the train's arrival, numbered considerably over 1000 people. As the train drew up at Scarborough station the Pahiatua Brass Band struck up' a lively melody and cheers were given by those

assembled. The station was decorated with bunting. A few minutes after the arrival of the train, the Mayor of Pahiatua , Mr Job Vile, mounted a small platform and addressed the Minister of Public Works, the Honourable Mr Hall-Jones, and party as follows.....

24<sup>th</sup> November 1897 Wellington Education Board and one of £2 15s to the Scarborough Committee, to satisfy the claims for damages to the building recently rented as a schoolhouse.

15<sup>th</sup> December 1897 Large bush fires are raging in this district, the township of Scarborough being in great danger. Parties are being organised to render assistance in keeping back the fires from the settlers' houses. The school is threatened by the fire.

17<sup>th</sup> December 1897 The township of Scarborough was in great danger at one time during the day. A large number of men fought the flames for some hours, and so saved several of the settlers' houses. The school was threatened, and was only saved through the exertions of a gang of workmen

12<sup>th</sup> January 1898 The fires were very destructive in the Mangahao Valley on Sunday. Mr F. Wyatt had his house and outbuildings burned down, and his fences were badly damaged. Mr Edwin Hall, of Scarborough, [Father of the schoolteacher Laura Hall] also lost his outbuildings. The flames went over a large extent of country, consequently the feed will be very short

14<sup>th</sup> January 1898 .....Early in the evening word of settlers "being burnt out was brought into town, and shortly afterwards families from Scarborough and Mangahao began to flock into town, having had to abandon their homes. The Pahiatua Railway Station was several times in danger, and at 6.30 o'clock the stationmaster's family had to be brought into town. The first news of loss was that Mr. Burt's house at Scarborough had been burned.....

7<sup>th</sup> March 1898 Me Robert Lee to inspect the school on Monday 14<sup>th</sup> March

6<sup>th</sup> June 1898 Pahiatua County Council From the Scarborough School Committee, asking the Council to reconsider its decision to grant the slaughter license to D. Knight on the ground that it would endanger the health of the children.—It was decided that the letter be received.

28<sup>th</sup> July 1898 Wellington Education Board and to pay £5 10s damages to Mrs Cleghorn's building at Scarborough. [Presumably the school building]

24<sup>th</sup> October 1898 Miss Millington, the Wellington Education Board's teacher of cookery, now conducts classes at Pahiatua (including at Scarborough and Makakahi) on Mondays, at Mangatainoka on Tuesdays,

27<sup>th</sup> October 1898 Wellington Education Board On the same trip the Chairman will enquire into the Scarborough Committee's request for an additional grant of £6 towards stumping its land.

8<sup>th</sup> May 1890 Pahiatua County Council Mr Edwin Hall [Father of the Head Teacher]waited on the Council with a petition signed by tire settlers of Scarborough, asking for a road leading into the Scarborough school, —It was decided that the request be granted, the expenditure to be limited to £20.

31<sup>st</sup> August 1899 Miss Olive Dorset transferred to Pahiatua School in the capacity of Pupil Teacher

Olive Dorset was at Pahiatua at the end of 1899 and was at Wairere for two years at Wairere and then spent another two years at Tane both sole charge followed by 1904 spent at Carterton School

In 1905 Olive was teaching for the Wanganui Education Board at Rewa in the heartland of the Manawatu Area on the Vinegar Hill Road

Married a school teacher in 1911 F E S Rockel was at Cross Creek in 1911, then at Kaitawa and Reikiorangi and then was a was at Kaiwairangi until at least 1923

30<sup>th</sup> November 1899 An application from Scarborough for a special grant for ordinary expenditure, as the Committee said the funds they had were not sufficient to carry on, was refused.

Mary Cleghorn only taught for the Wellington Education Board for the two years at Scarborough. I cannot find any other absolute information about her

21<sup>st</sup> March 1901 More about salaries Pupil Teacher Scarborough Attendance 48 Pupil Teacher proposed salary £25 rise £5

25<sup>th</sup> April 1901 Mary Leghorn [Sic] pupil teacher resignation accepted

7<sup>th</sup> May 1901 Wellington Education Board advertise for a Pupil Teacher

9<sup>th</sup> September 1901 Wellington Education Board still advertising for a pupil teacher

26<sup>th</sup> September 1901 Wellington Education Board The chairman was empowered to deal with the Scarborough school vacancy.

26<sup>th</sup> September 1901 Evening Post the Chairman was authorised to deal with the appointment of a master for Scarborough School.

Miss Agnes Burge was appointed pupil teacher at the Scarborough School.

28<sup>th</sup> September 1901 Miss Black is to assist Miss Hall at the Scarborough School for a month ;

2<sup>nd</sup> October 1901 Wellington Education Board The chairman was empowered to deal with the Scarborough school vacancy.

10<sup>th</sup> December 1901 At a rowdy meeting of shareholders in the Ballance Dairy Company at Scarborough on Saturday night, the lights were turned-out. The meeting ended in uproar.

30<sup>th</sup> December 1901 Wellington Education Board Scarborough. Salary £85 Mistress, Miss Burge didn't marry and ended up living in Wellington. She taught at Pahiatua from 1902 to 1905. She was at Wellington Training college in 1906 to 1907 and then came back to teach at Scarborough from 1908 to at least 1923 when my records end. I can find no further information than that above

8<sup>th</sup> February 1902 Featherston School Committee Some discussion took place in connection with the alterations in the teaching staff, and it was decided to endorse the Board's appointment of Miss Hall in place of Mr Malcolm who had been transferred to Scarborough.

12<sup>th</sup> February 1902 Mr J. Malcolm, of the local school teaching stall', who has been promoted to the position of head teacher at Scarborough, takes up his new duties at the beginning of next month. John Malcolm had been at Featherston for three years. In 1898 he was teaching at Greymouth School

14<sup>th</sup> February 1902 Miss Wallis, of the Masterton Infant School, has been transferred to the Scarborough School.

27<sup>th</sup> February 1902 Miss Hall, who has been connected with the Scarborough school for a number of years, was entertained at a "social" by the parents and school children on the eve Of her departure for Featherston. She was presented with a silver-mounted dressing-case and silver card case

28<sup>th</sup> February 1902 Featherston: At the public school, yesterday, Mr J. Malcolm was presented with a handsome silver mounted pipe and match-box by the scholars on the eve of his departure for Scarborough, where he has been appointed head-teacher

28<sup>th</sup> February 1902 A social and dance was given in the Schoolroom on Monday evening, by the parents of the children, lo Miss Laura Hall, who for many years has been head teacher at the Scarborough School, and under the new regulations has been transferred to Featherston. The room was packed. After a short concert programme was gone through, the chairman, Mr A. McFarlane, in a few well-chosen remarks, pointed out the great interest Miss Hall had taken in the children; how she was loved by them all, and at the great loss they would sustain by her leaving. He then presented her, as a slight token of esteem, in which she was held by all who knew her, with a gold brooch, a silver card case, and a set of silver mounted hair brushes, comb, and looking glass. Her father Mr Edwin Hall, of Woodville, an old settler, thanked all present for the handsome presents, and spoke of the early days before a school was started and' the kindly feeling shown to his daughter. He cordially wished the school and the future teachers every success. Refreshments were then handed round, the floor cleared, and dancing was indulged in till about 2. a.m. Miss Hall leaves for Featherston on Saturday.

30<sup>th</sup> April 1902 School Committee SCARBOROUGH. Messrs J. M. Stirling, A. Yule, A. E. Olliver, C. J. Billington, McFarlane (chairman), T. A. Stanton (these four were re-elected)

9<sup>th</sup> June 1902 It has been decided by the Education Department to give a series of lectures to Wairarapa school teachers in the various branches of hand and eye training. The first was given at the Masterton School on Saturday afternoon by Mr Malcolm, headmaster of the 'Scarborough School, and there were over sixty teachers present from all parts of the district. Mr W. H. Jackson, headmaster, introduced the lecturer, at the same time complimenting the teachers for their interest iv the work aa indicated by the good attendance. Mr Malcolm, in a very intelligible manner, explained and illustrated the development of a simple line into elementary geometric designs, and also went fully into the method of applying elementary modelling in plasticine to these figures. Modelling in "connection with any common objects and fruits, and also with ornamental designing were touched upon. Another lecture is to be given next week, when brush work and its application to pattern designing will be the subject.

Ethel Cooper started teaching at Mt Cook Infants in 1899 followed by two years at Newtown then one year at Opaki followed by 5 years at Scarborough. From 1908 to 1921 she was at Karori school and in 1923 was at Miramar South when my records cease

4<sup>th</sup> August 1919 Mr John Bringans, headmaster of the Scarborough School, Pahiatua, having been appointed to the charge of the Khandallah school, near Wellington, was, on Friday evening, presented by the teachers and parents with a set of fish knives and forks, enclosed in a handsome silver-mounted cabinet. A separate presentation of a solid silver cigarette case was made by the pupils. On Saturday he was entertained by the -Pahiatua Bowling Club and made a further presentation.

15<sup>th</sup> September 1919 Much excitement existed at Mangamutu and throughout the Pahiatua district when it became known on Friday evening that the ten-year-old daughter of Mr and Mrs Charles Sebelin, Mangamutu, who had been at school, was missing and had not been seen after 2 o'clock that afternoon. Search parties with lanterns, scoured the country in the night under the guidance of Constable Burrell, and about 4.30 on Saturday morning the fire bell was rung as a signal to call together additional searchers, A number responded to the call and went in the direction of Mangamutu, but it was not until 11 o'clock on Saturday morning that girl was discovered by Mr Daniel O'Brien on his property. It appears that the girl had been frightened by some school girls and had ran away. She had slept out all night and when found was crying bitterly

22<sup>nd</sup> December 1919 Mr Warwick, headmaster of the Scarborough school, and late of the Rongokokako school, has left for Wellington, en, route for Sydney.

6<sup>th</sup> October 1920 Over £200 has been subscribed for the erection of a hall at Scarborough.

28<sup>th</sup> August 1920 On Wednesday evening last a largely attended social and dance was held in the Mangamutu School, the occasion being a farewell tendered to Mrs Selby and family, who are removing to Masterton. Visitors were present from all the immediate districts, and also from Dannevirke, Rakanui, Carterton and Masterton, and the evening was a most enjoyable one. After the supper adjournment, Mr D. O'Brien, chairman of the School Committee, in a fitting little speech, eulogistic of the good qualities of Mrs Selby, said that they had felt they could not let the guests depart without some token of the esteem in which the family was held by the people of Scarborough. Mrs Selby had always been to the fore in anything done for the school, or any other work at Scarborough, the boys and girls had grown up amongst them, and the former had a record of service for the Empire second to that of no family in the district. He asked Mrs Selby to accept a silver tea service and oak tray, and presented to Miss Selby a handsome hand brush and mirror, and to Miss Florrie Selby a brooch. Mr R. Warwick, president of the Mangamutu Tennis Club, then presented the Misses Selby, who have been enthusiastic members of the Club and most assiduous in attendance at the courts, with a pair of silver vases and silver jewel case. Mr George Selby returned thanks for the presentation to his parent and sisters.

13<sup>th</sup> December 1930 A complimentary social was tendered Miss V. Williams, assistant mistress at the Mangamutu School for the past three years, in the Mangamutu Hall last evening. Miss Williams is now about to take up an appointment at Te Rapa near Hamilton, Waikato

21<sup>st</sup> April 1930 Mr D. O'Brien has a very fine record for school committee work. He has been associated with the Scarborough (Mangamutu) committee for 40 years, for 30 of which he has been chairman.

23<sup>rd</sup> December 1935 he annual concert - and Christmas tree, celebrations of the Mangamutu School pupils were held in the hall on Tuesday evening. An excellent programme, drawn up by the head teacher (Miss E. J. Harris), assisted at the piano by Miss G. Isakson, was presented by the children, and later the two ladies concerned were presented with bouquets,

made by Mrs L. .T. Heayns, in appreciation of the work they had done for the pupils. At the conclusion of the programme the Christmas tree celebration was hold. Father Christmas being present and distributing gifts to all. Later in the evening the chairman of the school committee (Mr D. O'Brien) presented certificates won by the children and thanked all those who had contributed to the Christmas Tree fund. He also paid a tribute to the ladies' committee for their good work in .selecting and apportioning the gifts, and warmly thanked Miss Harris for the excellent manner in which she had prepared the children for the concert. Mr O'Brien then handed out certificates as under: —Proficiency : Kenneth Sowry, the only Standard 6 pupil of the school. Attendance: Kenneth Sowry, Thomas O'Donnell. Donald Heayns, Joseph O'Donnell, Edwin Cheyne and Joan Gray. Calf rearing merit: Edwin Cheyne.

18<sup>th</sup> March 1936 A good number of children, parents and friends was present at the Mangamutu School picnic held on the Mangamutu Domain. Sports events occupied the greater part of the day.

23<sup>rd</sup> June 1936 The Mangamutu School euchre party on Friday night there was a large attendance. The first prize was won by Mrs C. Newman, with Mrs Beales second. Mr C. Pearcey won the men's prize, Mr Balsom being second.
