9th December 1915 Mr A. D. McLeod, who won the Wairarapa seat at the general election, was born in, 1872 on his father's station at Whakaponi and educated by private tutors, there being no school within 20 miles

27th January 1914 Resignation of Miss A Ogg accepted

27th July 1915 Resignation of Miss I Marley accepted

29th March 1916 Miss J. Rattray, sole teacher, Whakaponi

The total number of schools in active operation at the end of the year was 168, together with ten side schools, making 178 in all. During the year a new (aided) school was opened at Lowlands, and the schools at Akitio, Pori, and Pencarrow were reopened. The Native School at Okautete was inspected I for the first time. Three schools were closed, namely, Akatarawa, Mangapari, and Whakaponi
